The Battle River Community Foundation is taking part in the Community Services Recovery Fund along with Community Foundations of Canada, Canadian Red Cross, and United Way Centraide Canada.

The Community Services Recovery Fund is a \$400 million investment from the Government of Canada to support charities, non-profits, and Indigenous Governing Bodies as they focus on how to adapt their organizations for pandemic recovery.

Now more than ever, community service organizations (charities, non-profits, and Indigenous Governing Bodies) are playing a key role in addressing persistent and complex social problems faced by all Canadians. The Community Services Recovery Fund is responding to what charities and non-profits need right now and supports organizations as they adapt to the long-term impacts of the pandemic.

Projects funded under the Community Services Recovery Fund will assist community service organizations in the following areas:

- Investing in People: One-time projects that focus on how organizations recruit, retain, engage and support their personnel, including staff, volunteers and boards of directors.
- Investing in Systems and Processes:
   One-time projects that invest in the systems and processes involved in creating the internal workings of an organization's overall structure.
- Investing in Program and Service Innovation and Redesign: One-time projects primarily focused on program and service innovation and redesign using information gained during the COVID-19 pandemic.

At the Battle River Community Foundation, the focus for grants is on the second category of support – investing in systems and processes which will help local organizations recover and build resilience through enhancing their strategic planning, donor support systems, accounting functions, and more.

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## Your donations make good things happen!

Thanks to the support of donors, the Battle River Community Foundation is able to make good things happen in east central Alberta communities.

The featured grant recipient at our upcoming open house in Hardisty is the Hardisty Library. BRCF was honoured to be able to provide a grant of \$6,500 from funds allocated in support of the Hardisty area, which was used to renovate the library's entrance to include a wide sidewalk and automated door; and the facility's washroom areas, making the library accessible for all users.



The featured grant recipient you will hear from at the Camrose open house is Reading University. Now in existence for 15 years, Reading University has been supporting the Battle River School Division students to raise their literacy levels and become more confident readers and learners.

With the funding for RU being generated through BRCF grants and flowthrough donations, donor support is more



important than ever. Recently the Chase the Ace program presented by the Rotary Club of Camrose Daybreak contributed \$2,500 toward Reading University. Your support is critical to the program, too!
